Catalog Course Description: Principles and issues of health care management for family advanced practice nurses in primary care. Health promotion, disease prevention, and single acute problems of individuals across the life span and for diverse populations. Analysis of primary care practice topics using family frameworks and evidence based research.

Course Objectives: At the conclusion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Analyze the principles of primary care management for individuals within the context of the family across the life span.
2. Analyze family and other applied frameworks applicable to primary care practice of the APN.
3. Utilize protocols for common single acute problems seen in primary care practice based on literature review and outcome measures.
4. Recognize appropriate health promotion and disease prevention interventions for individuals with the context of the family across the lifespan.
5. Analyze the standards and outcome of the contemporary health care delivery system.
6. Analyze the role of the APN in relation to health conditions common in primary care practice.
7. Demonstrate cultural competence related to the individual's ethnicity, culture and lifestyle when considering health promotion and disease prevention strategies or developing the management plan for single acute conditions.

Evaluation/Grading Scale: Class assignments: The class assignments throughout the semester. will include quizzes, discussion board participation, clinical write ups and a behavior change assignment. Further information related to these assignments can be found in Angel.

Examinations: (midterm and final) will reflect evidence-based questions that require application of previously learned material. The Midterm exam will be conducted on-line in Angel. Specific information re: the exam will be posted in Angel. The Final exam will be a proctored exam. The student can elect to come to campus for the exam or have proctored at a site near their home. All proctor agreements will need to be into the faculty no later than midterm. Any agreements received after midterm will not be honored and the student will need to come to campus to take the exam. Proctor agreement form can be found in course Angel site.

Simulated Patient Experience: Participation in this experience is mandatory in order to pass. Further information re: the experience and grading criteria can be found in Angel.

On-Campus Lectures: Class attendance is expected. Participation grade may be affected if individuals do not attend or are late for class on a repeated basis.

On-Campus Suturing Lab: This is a mandatory experience and participation is required in order to pass. Students will be taught the basic principles related to suturing, local anesthesia and biopsy techniques.

Grading

A grade of 3.0 must be achieved in order to pass NUR 821 and progress in the nursing program. The MSU 4.0 grading system will be utilized to report final course grades.

Points will be rounded to whole numbers using the 0.5 rule. Points at ≥ 0.5 will be rounded up while those < 0.5 will be rounded down to the nearest whole number.

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Additional Course Description: The first Health Care Management course will focus on the principles and issues relevant to Family Advanced Practice Nurses in Primary Care. Emphasis will be placed on health promotion, disease prevention and single acute problems of individuals across the life span and for diverse populations. Analysis of primary care practice topics will occur by utilizing theoretical frameworks and evidence based research.

Additional Course Objectives:

1. Apply change theory to an identified lifestyle behavior that impacts individual or family wellness
2. Develop counseling intervention strategies to manage behavior change and mental health in the individual and family
3. Develop evidence based management plan for the prenatal patient
4. Develop management plans for the individual and family that integrate nursing diagnosis, outcomes and interventions
5. Apply principles of minor primary care procedures in the performance of suturing and lesion removal

Learning Methodologies:

This course is taught in a Hybrid format, with the majority of the content being online. As adult learners, it is expected that students will do relevant reading and study prior to class on the topic areas identified and be prepared to participate in online/on-campus activities each week. Faculty directed readings and web links might be provided for specific content areas. It is expected that students will search the literature and suggest/share relevant findings with faculty and classmates. On-line activities include discussion board participation, quizzes and or case studies that cover the content area for each week. The LAC is also be used as an evaluation tool, in which the students will need to apply course concepts to a standardized patient. Students will be active participants in the classroom and Angel.

Clinical Experience:

- All students participate in **80 hours of clinical over 14 weeks** at designated agencies. Further details about clinical hours can be found on ANGEL site. A clinical preceptor guides the agency experience. If at any time, a student is deemed clinically, ethically unsafe or acting in an unprofessional manner by the preceptor or faculty, the student will be reported to their MSU clinical faculty. This can be grounds for failure in the course.
- Students should dress according to agency guidelines and are required to wear their MSU ID tag.
- **Absences:** If the student becomes ill during the semester, it is her/his responsibility to notify her/his clinical preceptor, the clinical agency and your clinical instructor on the day of missed clinical. All missed clinical days must be made up prior to the final week of classes. Arrangements for make-up days are to be made with the clinical preceptor and clinical instructor.
- **HIPPA and Federal Compliance Guidelines are to be followed at all times.**
 - All patient identifying information must be blocked out in black prior to copying or distributing to faculty or classmates

- All information copied from the clinical site must be shredded by the student after use and prior to completion of program.
 - Instead of copying patient information from the chart, it is expected that the student will transcribe pertinent information from the medical records and include it in the SOAP documentation.
 - No information about patients should be shared outside of the educational experience.
- **Clinical Activity Log & Case Load Data**
 - The Typhon tracking system is used to track clinical activity. The students to update clinical activity access the database weekly. A clinical activities log and time log is provided to track information via the Typhon system
 - Typhon is accessed via the internet. A mobile device version is available to students for an additional fee.
 - The faculty will view data logs periodically, at midterm and final evaluation meetings with the clinical faculty.
